

# Otamatea Repertory Theatre Newsletter

### **Beginnings**

Repertory Theatre began in Great Britain in the early 1900s with the intention of making quality theatre available throughout the country. Repertory companies were established and produced new "weekly rep" plays every week or two. These were not at first true repertory theatres because they presented a series of short, continuous runs rather than keeping a ready repertory of plays. They began receiving government aid in 1946 and by the 1960s had developed "true rep" much like the state-supported theatre of other European countries.

Archival notes from the Kauri Museum state that ORT had its origins in the Paparoa Drama Group in the 1950's (or earlier), with a name change to Otamatea Repertory Society in 1957. They bought some land on Church Rd, Matakohe in 1966 and built a storage and rehearsal "shed" before building began on the current theatre in 1982. This new theatre and the group eventually became what we now know as ORT. Meanwhile, down the road, the Maungaturoto Entertainment Group was formed in 1963. In 1982 his group was approached by Otamatea Repertory Society suggesting amalgamation, but they declined and continued as they were for another 11 years. There is an earlier record of a programme advertising the "First Variety Concert", presented by the Paparoa Entertainment Party in the Garrison Hall, Paparoa in 1948 but it is unclear whether that was what became the Drama Group.

#### 2022 - and the return of drama to ORT!

Late last year Sheri O'Neill directed The Revlon Girl, a play based on the Aberfan disaster in Wales, 1966 in which 116 children and 28 adults died under a mountain of coal slag. This heralded new beginnings for us with the innovative use of props being a humorous addition. To recreate the drip from the leaking ceiling in the script we suspended a medical IV bag over the bucket then swung another bucket in under the bag when the rain stopped. Very technical and ingenious!
